V-CON III

Announcing V-Con III, the Third Vancouver Science Fiction Convention. The guest of honour is the author of <u>The Green Brain</u>, <u>Whipping Star</u>, <u>The Eyes of Heisenberg</u>, <u>Dragon In The Sea</u>, <u>The Heaven Makers</u>, <u>Destination: Void</u>, <u>Project 40</u>, <u>The Saratoga Barrier</u>, <u>The Godmakers</u>, <u>Dune Messiah</u>, and <u>Dune</u>, Frank Herbert. The convention occurs on February 22-24, 1974 at the Georgia Hotel in Vancouver – qand depending on the response, we have the flexibility of extending it in both directions. The cost is \$3.50 advance, \$10.00 with a banquet ticket (choice of stuffed chicken or baron of beef – price includes gratuity). Hotel rates for convention members are \$16/night for a single or \$21/night for a twin or double. After February 1st the convention membership fee goes to \$5.00 and the banquet to \$7.00, so pay early. (It helps us to plan better if we know how many are coming.) Hotel reservations may be made through us.

For example, Poul Anderson is a longtime WSCAN member and he rewrote The Broken Sword on the basis of his experience in Tournaments.

How many people are interested in organizing a local SCAN group? If you are, come to the next meeting and we'll discuss it fully. There's a lot more to it than I've written here.
