

So where were we?

Oh yeah, we were in 1983. I was 20 years old and still typing on my brand-new Olivetti electronic typewriter, the wonder of the age.



(Unfortunately, the wonder of the age soon developed a glitch which turned it into an Enigma code machine. I'd type in English and it would output Swahili, but that's another story.)

By then I'd

produced two issues of my fanzine Orion: The Canadian Magazine of Time and Space (a name only an 18-year-old could come up with!) The first issue came out in early 1981 and featured an interview with – and two-colour cover by – Captain Canuck creator Richard Comely. Other features included the parody strip Captain Chinook by Jean-Claude St. Aubin and the usual fanzine assortment of reviews, semi-pro fiction and fan art. The second issue didn't come out till early 1983, and featured a full-colour *Teen Titans* cover by Montreal comic artist Geof Isherwood, an interview with Titans creator Mary Wolfman, another interview with the brilliant Canadian comic artist Gene Day, a short story by the well-known SF author Lesley Choyce and, last but not least, Gabriel Morrissette's first published comic art! The comics and SF landscape in Canada was so barren in those days that, almost by default, Orion became a significant player in the field, and I started receiving submissions from professional SF writers and comic artists. Some

of my closest friendships and professional relationships, including my 20-plus years of collaboration with Gabriel, began in the *Orion* days.

Unfortunately, *Orion* was also cursed. Seriously! The first issue – cover screaming "Captain Canuck: The Triumphant Return of the Canadian Hero!" – was released on the same day that *Captain Canuck* 's publisher went bellyup. Far worse, in 1983, a mere day or two before *Orion* #2 was ready to go to press, I received word that Gene Day had died suddenly, at the age of 36, of an aneurysm caused by a blood clot. I was saddened by Gene's untimely passing, and more than a little freaked out. With my eyes on the comic book business, I let *Orion* slip to the sidelines.



Now, however, after years of talking about it, and talking about it some more, and dithering, and more talking about it, I have finally bitten the rubber bullet and joined *Comicopia*, and I

decided this would be a great opportunity to ditch the curse and bring *Orion* back. Why now, after all this time, and why in *Comicopia*? Well, I'm extremely proud of Mike and the rest of you for devoting yourselves to an APA for a full decade and a half. That's amazing! In a world where the bottom line increasingly seems to dictate everything, people dedicating themselves to the expression of pure creativity is little short of heroic, and I'd like to be a part of it. Moreover, even in these blog day afternoons, you're still making the effort to produce *Comicopia* on *paper*. I love the web, but online content

sometimes seems to lack – not just the *permanence* of print, but even the basic *reality* of print. Over the last two years I published short stories in a webzine and in a print anthology. Even though they were both paying markets, and even though the webzine actually paid more than the anthology, the story in the anthology somehow felt more real, more *published*.

Anyhow, enough of that. For those who don't



know me, Gabriel and I have been collaborating on comics together since the early 1980's, on projects like *Northguard, The Infinite Man, Gaijin* and *Angloman,* among other things. I'm also a science fiction writer and journalist, and the once and future publisher of Matrix Comics, where Northguard and

Company first saw the light of day. More recently, I've been writing the regular webcomic

Canadiana: The New Spirit of Canada with PEI comic artist Sandy Carruthers, who created the strip, and his protégé Jeff Alward. I know that Mike Aragona has been previewing Canadiana for you guys, and that will continue in *Orion*, more or less from where Mike left off.

Also in this is issue is *Techno-Squad*, a short Shainblum/Morrissette comic strip collaboration you've probably never seen, unless you read highschool career guidance books. It was created for *Look Ahead, Get Ahead: Growing Career Opportunities for Technicians and Technologists*, a book I edited while working at les éditions Ma Carrière.

So *Orion* returns from fanzine limbo after 22 years in *Comicopia's* 15th anniversary issue. Very appropriate, don't you think?

Thanks for having me aboard! It's going to be a blast!

What the Bleep Do We (K)now!?





Okay, this isn't our world and the fandoms we know. This is a world inhabited by Scrabble fanatics so fanatical that they play friendly \$1000 matches on their own time, and spend

most of their lives learning to spell words like "Qat," "Qaid," and "Qintar." (Yes, those are real words. Challenge at your peril.)

That said, Scrabble fandom is still a fandom -



even if you won't find "fandom" in the official Scrabble dictionary -- and its denizens are surprisingly recognizable. Word Wars follows the trials and tribulations of four engagingly weird and intense wannabe Scrabble champions in the

months leading up to the National Scrabble Championships in... wait for it... San Diego! It tells a hell of story through the eyes of four truly unforgettable Scrabble acolytes.

I have to admit, when Sandy Carruthers approached me with his concept for *Canadiana: The New Spirit of Canada* – a new Canadian



superheroine, I was dubious. Sandy and I had already worked together on the daily comic strip version of Richard Comely's *Captain Canuck*, and later collaborated on our own Elseworlds-type one-shot called *The New Original Captain Canuck: Utopia Moments.* In my immediate past was *Northguard, Angloman* and his Canadian-politics inspired supporting cast including *Canada!Man*. You can see why I'd be worried about getting typecast.

However, Sandy's concepts were so interesting, and his vision of the character so compelling, that I just couldn't resist his invitation to write the series. After all, it's not like trying to write *Spider-Man* or *The Avengers*, with 40 years of continuity hanging from your neck like an adamantium albatross. Sandy sketched out a very basic outline of the character and her history and let me run with the rest. Frankly, I had my doubts about my own resolve and ability to stick to a non-profit webcomic on an

ongoing basis, but here we are, over a year later and 34 episodes in, and we're still going strong.







Mike's been previewing Canadiana in his own section, so I've picked up more or less where he left off, with page 24 and the story sequence Sandy calls "The Thomson Rift".


