



Just some quick capsule reviews this time out!

Roswell Texax is a great alternate-reality series, set in a universe where Texas never joined the United States and became a major North American power.



It's a well-written and well-illustrated strip where the greatest fun is spotting the alternate-universe dopplegangers of famous people we know. Walt Disney as the president of the independent Republic of California, John Wayne as his top

military man, Meir Kahane and Malcolm X as loyal sons of Texas, and Texas Rangers to boot!

On the other hand, longtime science fiction author L. Neil Smith is well-known for his radical liberatarian "all government is evil" beliefs, and the series showcases his idealized Texas where government secrets are illegal, there's no standing army and gun ownership is mandatory, to name just a few points. If you can ignore the politics and just read the story, it's still an extremely fun read.

The same can't be said for an earlier Smith/Bieser collaboration, *The Probability Broach*. Originally published years ago as a graphic novel, it's now being offered for free on the Big Head website. Although it's just as competently written and illustrated as *Roswell, Texas*, it's nowhere near as much fun. Smith spends too much time beating his liberatarian drum, and it's really impossible to view the story as anything other than hammer-to-the-head propaganda. And sorry, liberatarianism – especially Smith's radical "every man for himself with a gun" form of it – is just a silly organizing concept for a society.

La Muse is an original superhero-ish (or at least superhuman-ish) series being presented for the first time on Big Head's site. It's still in the early stages, but its title character is a woman who is forced to reveal that she has superhuman powers during a terrorist attack in London, and subsequently gets swept up in the New York/Hollywood star-making machinery.

It epitomizes why I like Big Head as an online publisher so much, despite their obvious political agenda. Everything they publish is fully professional, well illustrated and well


written. I don't know who Adi Tantimedh and Hugo Petrus are, but I can imagine paying money for their work. And moreover, *La Muse* doesn't read like a political pamphlet. At least, not as much as the Smith-written series, and what politics it does have seem much closer to the non-woohoo! side of the ideological spectrum. Check it out! And don't miss *The Hook* and *The Architect*, created by longtime comic book writer Mike Baron, of *Nexus* and *Badger* fame.
