According to the Edinburgh's Bar Manager Alan Black (who was dressed proudly in his Scotty uniform) Scotty was the epitome of a Scotsman, and when Black

learned of Doohan's death, he immediately began

Even with the precautions, Anastacia of Warwick said several people each year do get hurt in the combats. Even without serious injuries, several participants in the battles at the Pitchfork War had withdrawn from the fighting by early afternoon because of minor injuries or because they were tired.

Winners of combat are determined on the honor system. The person being hit decides if the caliber of blow delivered would have been sufficient to penetrate armor had the weapons been real.

"It's the only sport I know of where your opponent decides if you win," Alderan of Blackwood said. "When I strike a blow, it's up to my opponent to decide if it's good enough.

"Everybody plays fair."

Not all blows are fatal, Alderan said. If a hard blow hits an arm or leg, the person hit loses the use of the arm or leg.

In addition to even fights between the two sides, a small fort was constructed, allowing one side to lay siege and try to overcome the defenders. These tended to be long combats with archers trying to eliminate enough defenders from long range to allow for a successful charge.

There were a number of archers taking part in the combats. Arrows are tipped with hard rubber heads and have tails that are specially constructed for
