ings championed the cause of Nerd-dom most eloquently, while <u>Kathryn Daugherty</u> and I expressed the more pessimistic view.

President Michael
Bernstein opened nominations for this year's election of SNAFFU officers. The final tally will determine the winner at the next meeting, though there will be provision for by-mail voting.

Not surprisingly, Michael and Vice President Darmon Thornton will stand for re-election. Somewhat shockingly, Ron Bushyager will provide the presidential opposition while Kent Hastings decided to run against Darmon. The fan most shocked by this unexpected turn of events will certainly be Ron, who was nominated in absentia by Lori Forbes.

April Reckling used a disparaging comment about SNAFFU in the latest Las Vegas Weekly to raise

a couple of dissatisfactions with current state of the club.

The more controversial one involved an allegation, made by a since-departed member, that he was told to muzzle his religious rhetoric during club discussions. The group

kicked around the topic and eventually decided that it was probably a simple misconception or misscommunication rather than a deliberate attempt to limit free speech. Everyone agreed we would watch this in the future to prevent inadvertent abrogation of free speech.

Exploring Fandom: The Enchanted Duplicator

Fandom has produced a tremendous range of literature. You give intelligent, verbal folks 75 years and they will come up with some fairly compelling stuff. Fandom has produce reams of delightful personal meanderings, formal essays, faan fiction (fiction about fans and fandom), humor and even poetry and songs.

One work stands above them all. It isn't the longest, the funniest or maybe even the best that fandom has produced, but no work says more about what it means to be a fan. It's called *The Enchanted Duplicator* – and it's nothing less than Fandom's universally recognized prose epic. Walter A. Willis and Bob Shaw, two fans in Northern Ireland, wrote it 50 years ago and it has been reprinted at least eight times since. (I co-edited one edition with rich brown in 1971 that featured artwork by Ross Chamberlain.)


The Enchanted Duplicator tells the story of Jophan's journey from his home in Mundane to the Mountain of Trufandom in his quest for the Enchanted Duplicator. It is an allegory of every fans growth from neo to a full member of the subculture. In a series of humorous encounters, Jophan meets a wide variety of fan types, including some that provide instructive lessons about what *not* to do in fandom.

Although Willis and Shaw keep the tone light with many jokes, puns and amusing allusions, *The Enchanted Duplicator* has serious underlying themes. Fandom has evolved quite a bit since the first publication of *TED*, but its universal concepts are still highly relevant to Fandom in the 21st Century.

Fundamentally, The Enchanted Duplica-

tor is a highly entertaining short story that should strike a chord with any real fan. That's fortunate, because no one is truly a Fan until they have read this masterwork and understood its message.

sis on book discussion. Michael pointed out that aversion to reading an assigned book had led to mass avoidance of meetings at which such reading was a prerequisite.

I suggested a compromise: have those who want to read a particular book under-

take to present a panel discussion. If more than four fans — pretty much the ideal panel size — read the book, they can ask questions and make contribute to the discussion from the audience. The club has four copies of Elizabeth Bear's first novel in paperback, so that may be the guinea pig book.

That's fine, though I would also like to see such panels discuss some of the classics. I'd think quite a few SNAFFUties have read the Foundation Trilogy, *Man in the High Castle* or *Stranger in a Strange Land*, so more fans might participate in the discussion.

Many club members would like to see more and wider participation at the meetings. More advance planning and premeeting publicity are apt to be the best way to achieve that goal.

That's probably an area in which VFW will be able to help a little. Look for advance information about SNAFFU (and other) meetings and events Right Here. Well, maybe a page forward or back, but Damn Close to Here in the final analysis.
