SNAFFU Election Results!

The winners of the 2006 SNAFFU election were announced at the 2/11 meeting — and things did not turn out altogether as expected. While Michael Bernstein overcame Ron Bushyager's involuntary campaign to earn a new one-year term as President, Kent Hastings narrowly out-pollled incumbent Darmon Thornton.

It's nearly impossible to analyze this type of election, in which two very popular local fans ran extremely low-key — make that “no key” — campaigns for an office that doesn't have well-defined functions. Maybe the electorate realized that putting Kent in office is the best way to lure him from his new home in Parts Unknown to the twice-a-month SNAFFU meetings.

Wish we had thought of this ploy to insure his

attendance at Vegrants meetings. We might've run into a little trouble, since the Vegrants do not have officers.

Science Fiction & Fantasy Day Announces Venue

The First Annual Las Vegas Science Fiction & Fantasy Fay, sponsored by the city's three major fan clubs, has announced a venue for the event. The one-day convention will be held at the Clark County Library at 11 E. Flamingo Rd. It is located at the corner of Escondido (1 block East of Maryland Pkwy).

The convention is scheduled for Saturday, April 30. Meeting of both SNAFFU and Las Vegrants will be held in conjunction with Science Fiction and Fantasy Day, the largest fan-run general convention in Las Vegas since the legendary Silvercons.

SNAFFU has appointed Lori Forbes and Woody Bernardi as co-directors of the SNAFFU

Library project. (See proposal on page 4).

Woody and Lori will work closely with Joyce and me to line up club members to help with the various tasks that must be completed before the new, larger SNAFFU library is ready to go into active service. The first step will be to clean out the Ga-

rage, followed by building the shelves, alphabetizing the books and preparing a computerized card catalogue. The four fans plan to get together late this week or early next and should be ready to begin nagging the

The Library Proposal

Joyce and I originally intended to make this proposal about the SNAFFU Library at the 2/11 meeting. Unfortunately, the weather here in the Mojave Jungle was rain with flooding, so Joyce wisely elected to stay home and watch "The Buddy Holly Story." So, as I promised SNAFFU's esteemed President, here is a detailed, written version of the proposal.

The SNAFFU Library is the club's most important asset, aside from the members themselves. It could be argued that it is the most important asset, again apart from the people, of Las Vegas Fandom. In recent times, the Library has not been displayed on shelves and, as a result, has become very hard to use.

April Reckling, among others, brought this dissatisfaction to a head at a recent SNAFFU meeting. Michael Bernstein explored several alternatives, none of which proved viable. Joyce and I think we have an answer and, after conferring with both Michael and Roxanne, are putting our offer in writing.

We would like to offer our garage as the new home of the SNAFFU SF Library. In addition, we want to give our own collection of science fiction books and magazines to the club. (This should come to at least 5,000 non-overlapping books and many, many science fiction magazines. We would make the library available, by appointment, to club members weekday early evenings and Saturday afternoons.

There has always been a question about whether SNAFFU or the Katzes have the largest collection in Nevada. This would end that discussion and give SNAFFU the largest collection in this region of the country.

That's what we offer, but there are some conditions:

1. Joyce and I will remain in physical possession of the collection unless we either move to a dwelling that is not large enough to keep it or move out of town. In those eventualities, the club takes possession of the unified collection. While we can house it, however, the club may not act to move it elsewhere (taking all our books and magazines in the process) as long as we maintain proper access.
2. We need the club's help to clean out the garage, build the shelves, unify and alphabetize the collection and make a computerized card catalog. Help means individual club members putting in some time working instead of whining.
3. The club must appoint a project leader who will be responsible for organizing the effort to set up the library, Joyce and I will help, but this is not going to be our project.
4. When the Library is established and ready to lend books, the club must appoint or elect a Librarian to oversee and maintain this giant collection.

I hope the members of SNAFFU will consider this proposal, discuss it online and in person and be ready to vote it down or accept it at the next Westside SNAFFU meeting.

An Introduction to the Futurists

Las Vegas fans recently made the surprising discovery that another club, the Las Vegas Futurists, meets at a Borders bookstore close to the one SNAFFU uses for its meetings that same Friday night. Correspondence with Gilda Cabral, a leading member of the group, indicates that the Futurists have no direct connection to Science Fiction Fandom, but may well have common ground and shared goals. Gilda kindly provided the following capsule history and backgrounder.

The Las Vegas Futurists (as well as LAFuturists, BAFuturists, and SDFuturists) has its roots starting out as a book club. In true book club form, the LvFuturists reading focus is on science and technology books.

The format being: each monthly session has a pre-determined topic based on ideas presented by a specific book. It isn't a prerequisite to have read the book prior to the meeting, but each meeting has a discussion leader (the discussion leader changes from month to month) who has read the book and will summarize the book for the meeting attendees. Additionally, the leader is to come up with discussion topics which are based from ideas presented by the book but are geared to find application of the ideas in a society of the future or an exploration of a particular technology, or style or notion. These explorations include public opinion, acceptance, public policy, etc. My personal goals are to educate, to inspire, and to reduce fear of change as many people find the science and technology a fast moving train that not everyone can catch.

As you see, there is less "fan-dom" here, but like science fiction and science fantasy there is a lot of room in "science fact" for creativity and opportunity to get the "neurons firing". I search for books and topics such as artificial intelligence (my special interest and career focus), biotech, neuro-science, nanotechnology, etc. Here is where I think I our respective groups can have some fun exploring: all these topics have analogous fiction-based books and fact-based books. Some SF writers deliver both. I've found that a science fiction-based reading can still be the springboard of discussion based on the real world as a science fact-based book.

Now all of the futurists groups mentioned above have evolved from being strictly a book club to speaker oriented presentation. Our LVFuturists group celebrated a 1 year birthday in November 2004 and is one of the younger futurist groups. It is somewhat of a hybrid of a reading group and a presentation-style meetings.. I attempt to bring in people who have their hearts and minds on a particular subject to share with the group. On months where I can't find speakers, we review books. I have had the fortune to have met so many people and in many scientific and literary disciplines. While the futurists meetings have a by product of being a professional networking venue (this is more true of the Bay Area Futurists) the various futurists groups, clubs, special interest groups provide a venue for people who are primarily optimists who look at each discovery and invention with anticipation and wonder. — Gilda Cabral

This event is open to all fans in Las Vegas. Please feel free to pass along the information. Those who wish to bring minors (under 21) should note that they will not be permitted in the bar, though this does not af-

fect the room for the Sunday Social.

Explaining the impetus behind the Sunday Social, Woody Bernardi notes, "There are several fans who are only off on Sundays, who can only make a Sunday

event. Also, a few of the fans who live on the Westside, including myself, thought it would be good to host a monthly VSFA Sunday Social on that side of town.”

Marcy Waldie Surgery Successful!

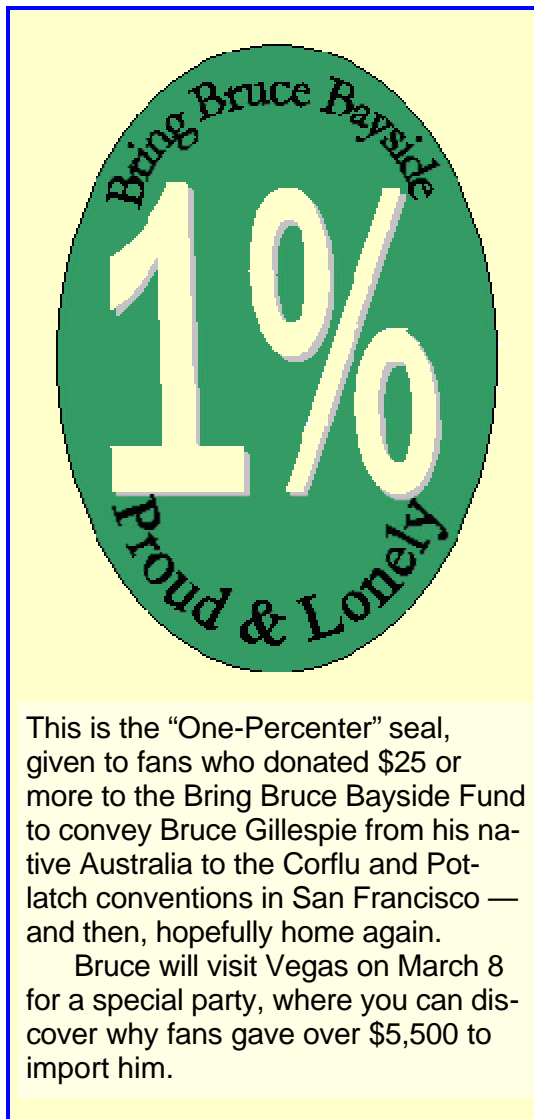
There’s finally some unequivocally *good* medical news about one of the most widely popular and admired fans on the Vegas scene, Marcy Waldie.

The road to the operation on her left knee, needed to replace worn parts from the earlier knee replacement, has been rocky. She actually got to the hospital for the operation in early February, only to have it canceled at the last minute.

The good news is that Marcy had her knee surgically repaired on Wednesday (2/8) and so far everything looks great. She is now convalescing at home and should be ready to play “kneesies” after some rehabilitation.

Joyce’s Operation Set for February 25

Just about the time the fanzine fans are settling in for a long weekend of revelry at



their worldcon, Corflu, in San Francisco, Joyce Katz will be entering an operating theater at the Southwest Medical Center for additional surgery on her right ankle.

The High Priestess broke both ankles, the right one in three places, last April. The left one has healed fully, but the right one has not responded as well. It was fine until the beginning of February, when it abruptly began hurting very badly to the point that it became hard for Joyce to walk.

A foot specialist who examined her last week feels that removing the plate and seven screws in her ankle is the logical first step. On Tuesday (2/22) she will go for pre-operative tests, Thursday the surgeon will check her over and Friday will be the operation. She is expected to come home on the same day, though there will be some recuperation ahead.

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SNAFFU (2/11) Meeting Report — Michael Bernstein

The election included a minor upset. Kent Hastings was elected vice president by a very narrow margin over Darmon Thornton. Yours truly was elected President by a wider margin. Although Kent is moving to Pahrump, he does intend to regularly attend meetings and believes he can carry out his Vice-Presidential duties. In fact, he already has many vices.

The Katz's generous offer for housing the library was enthusiastically received by the members. We've formed a library committee for organizing and planning. Committee co-chairs: Lorie Forbes, Woody Bernardi. Other committee members: Darmon Thornton, Rachel Mainz, Jolie LaChance. (Jolie is a new member who joined on Friday, but has the unique qualification of being a carpenter. besides, she volunteered)

Darmon Thornton proposed that, to raise money for the club, we set up a CafePress store to sell SNAFFU-branded items. As this involves no out-of-pocket expense, this was approved by the membership. Darmon volunteered to set it up.

Once we had disposed of the elections, dues collection and the library, we continued with the actual meeting, which was a discussion of the best books we had read in 2004.

My pick was *Singularity Sky* by Charles Stross, a rollicking big-ideas novel that grabs handfuls of inspiration and concepts from existing sub-genres such as space-opera, time-travel and espionage, and synthesizes them with a whole gob of original material to create something truly original. Kent Hastings chose a new graphic-novel reinterpretation of L. Neil Smith's 1980 novel *The Probability Broach*.

Ron & Linda Bushyager reported enjoying the first three novels in Steve Brust's Draeger series, *Jherag*, *Yendi* and *Teckla*.

Lori Forbes read Ray Bradbury's *Fahrenheit 451* for the first time as part of the library district's 'One Community, One Book' program, and found it to be a very good read that had stood the test of time very well.

Rachel Mainz said she enjoyed Jane Lindskold's "Wolf" series (*Through Wolf's Eyes*, *Wolf's Head*, *Wolf's Heart: The Dragon of Despair*) and that although the third book was somewhat disappointing, the recently released *Wolf Captured* made up for it.

Shane Roth talked up *Fitzpatrick's War*, an unusually constructed book conceived as something of a palimpsest. The novel purports to be the memoirs of someone in the 25th century describing the emergence of a pre-industrial global empire (after all technology more advanced than steam power had been permanently destroyed in the late 21st). Overlaid on this are extensive footnotes written by 26th century historians debunking the entire work as a fraud, as it contradicts nearly everything they consider factual about the origins of their own culture, and particularly the revered leader (Fitzpatrick) who created it.

Jolie LaChance mentioned Lois McMaster Bujold's *Paladin of Souls*, a sequel to *The Curse of Chalion*. Other members who had read both agreed that the second book was indeed better, but that both were definitely worth reading as very original high fantasy that owed nothing to the Tolkien inspired tradition.

Terry Wilsey suggested *The DaVinci Code*. Some objected that it wasn't meant as a work of fiction. Terry replied that *he* enjoyed it as such, so who cared what the author thought? Woody Bernardi reported reading many of the novels Catherine Asaro has written in her "Skolian Empire" universe.

After wrapping up the discussion, we went to dinner at Chili's restaurant. All in all, the meeting was informative and enjoyable.

Forry's book *is* from Collectors Press -- the same company that did Frank Robinson's *SCIENCE FICTION OF THE 20TH CENTURY: AN ILLUSTRATED HISTORY* (now available in a trade paperback for \$19.95 -- but only at Barnes & Noble, Frank informed me last weekend when Carol & I joined him in San Francisco to see *POLAR EXPRESS* in 3D at the IMAX) and Dick Lupoff's *THE GREAT AMERICAN PAPERBACK* -- so one might expect (and as I re-



call) the print quality of those bubble-gum trading card-sized images is pretty good.
