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Exploring Fandom: What is fwa & AFAL?



I don't know if the rest of you read colophons — that's the box at the bottom of page one — but they contain a lot of interesting information. For some readers, the *VFW* colophon may also raise a question or two. Specifically, the meaning of "fwa" and "AFAL," two organizations in which *VFW* claims membership, may be something of a puzzle.

"Fwa" — the initials are always in lower case for some reason <u>Ted White</u> could probably explain. He is the fan most closely identified with this organization and was a motivating force in its organization a little over two decades ago.

The initials "fwa" stand for "Fanzine Writers of America." It's a somewhat ironic comment about American parochialism. "Fanzine means any fan-literary endeavor, "writer" means all who write or draw for Fandom and "America" means the whole world.

The fwa is the model of a fannish organization. Since it does absolutely nothing at a ny time, there is no reason to collect dues. Since there are no dues, there is no membership roster or, indeed, any process for generating one. You

become a member by stating the fact in the colophon of your fanzine.

The only known function of the fwa is to elect its Past President at the Corflu banquet each year. Yes, the *Past* President. At Corflu Blackjack in 2004, fans elected Joyce and I as co-Presidents of fwa for 2003. That way, the fwa's only officer has no duties or power, which certainly limits the possibility that something will go wrong.

Even before we received this honor, I have always said that being Past President of fwa is one of the greatest honors Fandom can bestow. You can't ask for it, campaign for it or wheedle your way into it.

AFAL stands for the Academy of Fanzine Arts & Letters — and it was created during Silvercon 2, right here in Las Vegas! An odd feature of the convention was the presence of a B-movie actress who attended the con to promote her fantasy novel of dubious merit. The book's cover had a seal of approval from a group with a fancy name that none of us recognized. It seemed probable that if the group existed at all, her agent (or boyfriend) was probably the only member.

"We need something like that for Fandom," said <u>Ted White</u>, more or less, at an afternoon party at Silvercon. He pointed out that if we concocted our own pseudo-literary foundation, we could have the group approve our fanzines.

I'll be brutally honest here. I am not sure why we all felt it was such a good idea, but nonetheless, we did. Afternoon parties at Silvercons were like that.

In any case, we kicked around names until Academy of Fanzine Arts and Letters became the consensus choice. Many fanzines have carried that affiliation ever since.

Unlike the fwa, AFAL does not elect a Past President. After all, none of us are fit to serve at the head of such a prestigious body. AFAL's sole purpose is to appear in fanzine colophons.

You think our feuds are bad? Some of their early ones were fought with six-guns...

Who was the first chief executive of SNAFFU? (Two points)

was a member of both NAPA and UAPA and there's little doubt that Wolheim got the idea from him, even joining them himself. Since I wrote about it fairly recently, let me excerpt the pertinent paragraph:

"But HPL's most significant contribution to stf fandom was probably his indirect influence in the formation (by Donald A. Wollheim and John B. Michel) of the microcosm's first apa, the Fantasy Amateur Press Association (FAPA) in 1937. Although differing from mundane apas by limiting members (starting at 50 but raised to 65 in 1943) and having minimum activity requirements, it seems obvious that the mundane apas Lovecraft belonged to inspired the notion. [Robert] Lichtman agrees: 'I don't think this is speculation at all, but established fact. Via their exposure to HPL and knowledge of his involvement with ayjay, Wolheim at least joined the NAPA and perhaps UAPA for a few years back in the '30s and definitely modeled the original FAPA constitution and organizational structure on NAPA's. If you have early FANTASY AMATEURs, you find in them reports on the mailings from the Official Critics, a quaint custom he definitely got from NAPA." Sam Moskowitz effectively confirms this in The Immortal Storm, noting that Wollheim distributed THE PHANTA-GRAPH through 'three amateur press associations simultaneously'; since FAPA was

One Fan's Corflu Titanium — Randy Byers

With all the Corflu mentions, held in Las Vegas in 1993 and 2004, I thought something about this year's edition might be enlightening. Fortunately, Seattle fan <u>Randy Byers</u> rose to the occasion with this entertaining report. Randy is co-editor of CHUNGA, "Best Fanzine" in the 2005 Fan Achievement Awards bestowed at Corflu Titanium. This is only one of dozens of great things you can find on Victor Gonzalez's "must read" website, Trufen.net

Well, it seemed like a long way to travel to talk to Arnie Katz on the phone, but I had a great time at Corflu Titanium. Shocking as it may sound, I am exhausted, just having arrived back in Seattle three hours ago. So I'll just make some incoherent noise as a first reaction to the convention.

Mike says there were 120 attendees, which sounds about right to me. The problem with a Corflu of that size is that I wanted to have a long talk with near-enough every one of those 120, but there wasn't near enough time. Barely got a chance to say Boo! to Earl Kemp, for example, and I didn't realize that Gary Mattingly was even at the convention until I got home.

I arrived at the convention at midnight on Friday, so I missed the party for Bruce Gillespie Thursday night and the opening ceremonies on Friday. But I got a charge out of the reaction when I announced on my arrival that I had copies of James Bacon's TAFF report, which the bastard has completed only five months after his trip. He certainly showed me up! Jaws dropped all around me at the news, and a number of copies were hurriedly bought and examined for signs of fraud.

The fan fund auction on Saturday was also a big success, raising good money for TAFF, DUFF, GUFF, and the Dan & Lynn Steffan Are Moving to Portland, Oregon Fund. Andy Hooper, Peter Weston, Jerry Kaufman, and Marty Cantor were the auctioneers, and there were lots of cool zines and goodies on the block. Of the things I got, my favorite is probably NYCON COMICS, a promotional for the New York in 1967 Worldcon bid. The cover is by Ross Chamberlain, and the contents are a twelve page comic strip by Jack Gaughan called Second Stage Fanoclasts, or The Fellowship of the Lens Meets The Menace from Beyond Civilization. Very cool!

The good thing about a Corflu of this size is that I didn't just hang out with people I already knew but also spent quality time with more people that I'm getting to know over time. That included Arnie Katz, even if it was just a brief chat over the phone, when about a dozen of us took turns talking to Arnie from Ted White's busy room. Arnie wanted to know what I thought of the cover of the new CRAZY FROM THE HEAT (another Ross Chamberlain opus), and I had to confess that it had kicked my ass. Good one, Ross!

It would appear that fanzines are alive and well. It feels good to be part of it. I'm not sure Dave O'Neill will feel the same after drinking all that wine on top of the beer last night, but he seemed to have a good time at his first Corflu nonetheless. And thankfully Victor didn't try to use my head as a pillow two nights in a row ...
