



The Enchanted Duplicator Kat

Note: I wrote about The Enchanted Duplicator 'way back in VFW #10, when it was still four pages. With the discussion of TED coming up at the next SNAFFU meeting, it seemed right to do an article about TED. This is an expansion and revision of the original piece.

Fandom has produced a tremendous range of literature. You give intelligent, verbal folks 75 years and they will come up with some fairly compelling stuff. Fandom has generated

reams of delightful personal meanderings, formal essays, faan fiction (fiction about fans and Fandom), humor and even poetry and songs. A few have even been so bold as to write about Science Fiction and Fantasy. (I have heard rumors of (shudder) capsule book reviews, but I wouldn't know of such things, personally.)

One work stands above them all. It isn't the longest, the funniest or maybe even the best, but no work says more about what it means to be a fan. It's called *The Enchanted Duplicator* – and it's nothing less than Fandom's universally recognized prose epic. Walter A. Willis and Bob Shaw, two fans in Northern Ireland, wrote it 50 years ago and it has been reprinted 11 times. (I coedited one edition with rich brown in 1971 with artwork by Ross Chamberlain and Ross and I are at work on a new edition right now.)

The Enchanted Duplicator tells the story of

Jophan's journey from his home in Mundane to the Mountain of Trufandom in his quest for the Enchanted Duplicator. It is an allegory of every fan's growth from neo to a full member of the subculture. In a series of humorous encounters, Jophan meets a wide variety of fan types, including some that provide instructive lessons about what *not* to do in fandom.

If you're expecting a preachy, sermonizing screed, forget it. *The Enchanted* Duplicator imparts its lessons with wit, humor and evocative word-pictures. Fandom has evolved quite a bit since the first publication of *TED*, but its universal concepts are still highly relevant to Fandom in the 21st Century.

Fundamentally, *The Enchanted Duplicator* is a highly entertaining short story that should strike a chord with any real fan. That's fortunate, because no one is truly a Fan until they have read this masterwork and felt the tug of its fannish spirit.

It's a light, pleasant read and it's readily available. Take the journey to the Tower of Trufandom and you'll be a better fan for having made the trip. — Arnie

Getting Steamed Up!

rich brown's Fanhistory Concern

We were talking, earlier, about a propensity of fans to laugh at their foibles, including making fun of the feuding that sometimes springs up among us.

One of the best, and probably most entertaining, mock feuds was the battle over steam between UK fans Ken Bulmer and Vincent Clarke, on the one hand, and Walt Willis (of Belfast, North Ireland) and Lee Hoffman (of Savannah, Georgia) on the other.


The sheer Machiavellian guile of Bulmer can be seen and admired in retrospect by virtue of the fact that, long before this mock feud broke out, he cleverly established his claim to be the "inventor" (a.k.a. "the father") of steam to Willis who, per the above, was destined to be his adversary in the proceedings.

It was during a visit Willis paid to his home, the Epicentre, that Bulmer, apparently noticing the phenomenon for the first time, openly observed the fact that the lid to his tea kettle appeared to be lifted by the strange forces that resided in the vapors produced by the boiling waters, and speculated to Willis on the possibility of someday harnessing this very energy, perhaps even to provide transportation and other unnamed but easily imagined vast benefits to all mankind.

It was really not very long thereafter that



Lee Hoffman, editor of the monthly *Quandry* (regarded by many as the best fannish fanzine of all time) formed Hoffmanothing to supply the needs



of the Ft. Mudge Steam Calliope Company, which was tied in some unspecified manner to her publishing ventures.

Vincent Clarke, acting as Bulmer's /m/o/ u/t/h/p/i/e/c/e/ barrister, sent notice to Ms. Hoffman that this was a clear infringement of Mssr. Bulmer's patent or copyright or whatever it was.

Rather than pay Bulmer the fees or honoraria suggested by Clarke, however, Ms. Hoffman retained the services of Walter Alexandrew Willis, whose legal expertise may be gauged by the fact that neither he nor his firm had apparently ever heard of the concept of "conflict of interests." He countered

Bulmer's sheer Machia-vellian guile with his own sheer Machiavellian indifference to the fact that he'd been "set up" to be the best witness to Bulmer's claim that the use of steam was his intellectual property -- Willis was Hoffman's most popular columnist, he took up the cudgels of representing her defense.

As is usually the case when matters turn litigious, no real "results" were obtained by either side, and although Hoffman and Bulmer managed

(without the aid of legal counsel) to reach enough agreement among themselves to form an international group to supply white

steam for general use (a.k.a. "Fair Steam"), clearly the edge was off.

The legal exchanges were really only so much hot air -- but that, of course, is a vital element in the production of steam.

The saddest thing, perhaps, is that neither firm managed to capture the markets they should have, as witness the fact that NASA went on to utilize those dreadfully expensive liquid-fuel rockets.

In all the world, there's not a single steam-powered computer to be had.

Cooperation would have been ever so much better.

VSFA Slams the Door On Listsery Discussion

In a post signed only with the organization's name, VSFA expressed hostility toward the current discussion about the future of locally oriented listservs in Las Vegas. Here's the complete text:

"It's become very apparent that we need to clarify some issues before they continue escalating beyond the realm of reality, even though we are a science fiction and fantasy group!

"Several members have now voiced concerns over the possible dissolution of our listserv due to recent postings about the *VFW* column.

"Be assured that VSFA is not considering ending it's very successful and active discussion list and calendar. Regardless of any discussions by any other groups, we will continue to maintain an open, active listserv and calendar as long as our members are posting and we have events to be scheduled.

"VSFA's listserv has been and will continue to be open to all F&SF groups who want to post their activities along with VSFA's. If there is overlap, so much the better for people seeking information. If some items get posted on only VSFA's site and, therefore, not seen by some that is unfortunate but VSFA cannot be responsible for maintaining everyone else's listservs.

"Information posted to the VSFA Calendar and/or message board is for public consumption. Any events which are announced on VSFA can be shared with other listservs, as some people have already done."

In light of this, it's useless to continue discussion of this topic. Accordingly, the Digital Town Meeting will look to other subjects.

That Original Harry Warner Form LoC cartoon was one I'd never seen and I love it! So often, my own LoCs fall along the same lines.

Sounds like the Futurists put together good talks.

Rich brown's Fan History Corner was nice to see. rich always has a lot to say and a good way of saying it. I'm glad to see that I'm not the only Bay Area who has ever had terribly strange ideas like a tower of Bheer cans.

Arnie: Thanks to Rotsler's epic generosity, I still have quit a few unused illos that will gradually make their way into VFW and other zines. And I couldn't agree with you more about Vegas' bounty of artists: Chamberlain, White and Kunkel are three aces – and they all can write, too.

That's neat about getting a mention in *Time*. I first saw a home video game -- Pong -- at your Brooklyn apartment. It's hard to grasp now how amazing that was. Up til then a TV was something I looked at. Period. To make something happen on that screen was pretty wild.

Now I see you tried to protect me from my loccol comments by burying my name under a text box (or something)! I'm not sure I said what I intended to say. I think Fandom is an amalgam of social interaction and creativity.

If you participate in fandom as a writer or artist the creative aspect is strong and people who create tend to want validation of their work, if only to feel they're connecting with an audience, which is really the purpose of art.

When I was running in road races I was happy to finish in the middle of the pack because I'm no athlete and so just to be average at running was a good accomplishment and made for an enjoyable hobby. But however congenial I might find fandom otherwise it isn't going to be highly attractive to me to participate as a writer at a middling level when I can participate at a much higher level in other venues. Now to just participate as a "consumer" and enjoy reading some zines and writing locs and keeping in touch with people such as yourself -- that's different.

I should add, awards and such are nice to have as an indication that one's creative efforts are doing what they are supposed to do -- connect with an audience. I like praise directed at my work, not at me personally. Our publisher is wonderfully understanding of my refusal to do book signings and appearances. I tried a few, was on some authors' panels at a couple conventions, but I just don't enjoy being spotlighted. I know authors who love being the center of attention, but it just makes me uneasy.

Now I'm wondering if the weekly schedule you and Chris Garcia are keeping has thrown my faanish metabolism off-kilter. Zines are supposed to appear a couple times a year...maybe. I fear I might have evolved at high speed and got all the way to Gafia in five months!

Arnie: No, indeed, your weekly dose of VFW is the fannish equivalent of Buns of Steel. Read it every week and soon you'll be shooting out quips and making multi-level puns like a Walt Willis.
