

Three Major Events Will Highlight Las Vegas' Big Weekend '05 II!

Labor Day has long occupied a special place on the Fannish Calendar. Though this year's World Science Fiction Convention took place a couple of weeks ago in Glasgow, Scotland, the Labor Day Weekend is traditionally a time to celebrate being a fan.

Las Vegas fans who don't slip away for a three-day-weekend trip will be celebrating at three socially-oriented events. Here's what's on tap:

1. The Chicago Science Fiction League Dinner Meeting. Founded more than 60 years ago in Chicago, the CSFL has flourished since its rebirth in Las Vegas in the early 1990's. The club has thrived on its policy of seeking reparations from all conventions held on its Chicago Turf since Chicon I in 1940 and eating some of the best hot dogs in the known universe.

The CSFL is the only current Las Vegas fan group with its own membership card. Moreover, the card confers the only tangible benefit offered by any Glitter City Science Fiction club: If you

It did not last long, but it leaves an indelible memory in the minds of all the fans who knew and loved it during its brief life. They were a horny bunch, of course, and they made a few moose-takes, but its record stands as testimony to the greatness of a Fandom that will never be forgotten by the fans who lived it.

Elk City, OK, Fandom began on Saturday, August 27, with bright hopes. That's when its first two members, esteemed and well-known fans both, <u>Ben & Cathi Wilson</u>, motored into town. The club wasn't a particularly formal organization, in line with their fannish history. It is rumored that the very first night featured Wild Sexual Excess. That's a great start for any fan club and the Elk City fans hoped that the fact that all Elk City fans were having sex with all other Elk City fans might soon induce other fans to this new Center of Fandom.

It's no over-statement to call Elk City Fandom an overnight sensation. Its leading fans had spent overnight together and, reportedly, there were plenty of sensations.

It took only that one, first night to firmly establish Elk City Fandom. The next morning, its two foremost fans discovered that they just couldn't leave. Maybe it was the magnetic lure of a new local Fandom being born or maybe it was the dead starter in their car, but they both literally could not leave the fast-rising fan center. (Going from no fans to two BNFs in 24 hours is, after all, unparalleled in fanhistory.)

Through Saturday, Sunday and Monday they reveled in the round of meetings, meals and other events that made Elk City Fandom so memorable. That was the Golden Age of Elk City Fandom, Meyer, and it will never be forgotten.

Then as happens to all too many local Fandoms, circumstances caused by the Mundane World brought a quick and noisy end to Elk City Fandom. The repair shop installed a starter and, suddenly, all of Elk City Fandom decided to embark on a road trip to Flippin, AR.

Reports are that, like <u>Woody Bernardi</u>'s road trip to Boston, that has turned into permanent relocation. Shorn of its leading fans, Elk City Fandom is no more. Prospects for a resurgence aren't good, though for mer Elk City fans <u>Ben & Cathi Wilson</u> are expected to add its special flavor to the budding fannish metropolis of Flippin.

Elk City Fandom is gone, but its spirit will live on in fannish hearts. And I say that's a Damn Good Thing. — Arnie

Something wonderful has been happening — and I give and a active and respected all the credit for it to Fandom. (Well, maybe with an "assist" to the Internet.)

Came an active and respected fan in St. Louis and then Colu MO, but he gafiated while I we have a support of the Internet.

On Saturday, I got emails from two people who mean a lot to me. I hadn't heard from either of them in more than three decades. As I sat in front of my computer, wide-eyed at the names that had miraculously appeared on in my email queue, I realized that this was actually the third and fourth pleasant experience of this kind that I'd had in the last few months.

The first person who came back into my life is <u>Richard A Lupoff</u> (as he is known to his admirers in the professional world — and if you haven't bought *The Best of XERO* yet, do so now). We had some fleeting contact a year or two ago, discussing agents, but recently we've begun to build a more personal connection again.

Dick and his wife Pat (she of the smackable ass described in his column in *VFW #41*) were among the first major fans to welcome a young neo "with a thin veneer of sophistication," as Dick described the teenaged Arnie Katz after our first meeting.

I'd made the long trip from Long Island to Newark, NJ, for a Sunday meeting of the Eastern Science Fiction Association (ESFA) that turned out to be canceled. Dejected, I took the Public Service bus back to Manhattan and, on the spur of the moment, called the Lupoffs. I was unaware that New York fans had grown gun-shy of such calls due to the antics of Andy "Phone Fan" Silverberg. N3F Fugghead Seth Johnson had lectured me on the Evil of the Lupoffs and, though I'd defended them staunchly in correspondence, I was braced for the worst.

Instead, they welcomed me into their flashy eastside apartment and spend the afternoon talking to me in the friendliest possible way. Dick proved to be a big, amiable guy with a lively sense of humor and Pat was quite simply the most impressive woman I'd met in Fandom.

Within a few years, we'd become close friends. We often went to the Filmore East to see the rock bands and I

must have spent a hundred weekends in Poughkeepsie after they moved there. In fact, that's where I spent the weekend of Woodstock.

Time, circumstances, their move to the BArea and gafiation parted us 30 years ago. Recently, I started sending Dick *VFW* and he began sending terrific letters. Now we're starting to relate as friends again.

I can't say for sure, but I think <u>Hank</u> <u>Luttrell</u> was one of the 80 or so fans who sent a dime for *Cursed #1*, the fanzine with which <u>Lenny Bailes</u> and I entered Fandom. He be-

came an active and respected fan in St. Louis and then Columbia, MO, but he gafiated while I wandered through the Glades of Gafia.

Joyce, a former fellow St. Louis fan, and I had often speculated on what Hank might be doing these days. Evidently, he has been dipping a digital toe into efanzines.com. Now he's back o0n the mailing list and, we earnestly hope, back in our lives.

Because <u>Dick Lupoff</u> and I were now back in contact, he forwarded a satiric electronic clipping about the attempt to dignify the theory of Intelligent Design as an alternative to Evolution. I liked the story, but I positively went into orbit when I noticed who'd sent it to him: <u>Hal Hughes</u>.

Hal was clerking at an East Village comic book store, when <u>Alexei Panshin</u> stopped in on his way to a Fanoclasts meeting. Hal charmed him so thoroughly that he brought him along to <u>Ted White</u>'s place — and he became one of the most popular guys in the group. A terrific singer and musician, Hal led many an evening song-fest, always involving everyone and never parading his ego or demanding the spotlight just because he had more musical talent than the rest of us put together.

I lost track of him when he moved to the BArea (circa 1971, I think). I dropped him a note and, on Saturday, got a long and fascinating letter. He has become a professional writer/editor, so it's not even out of the question that you may see him in these pages.

One of the reasons <u>Hank Luttrell</u> broke 30 years of silence was to gently correct a comment in *VFW* about the reasons for the gafiation of <u>Creath (rhymes with "Death")</u> <u>Thorne</u> in the early 1970's. It turned out that Creath had recently contacted him to renew *their* friendship and take the first step on the road back to Mother Fandom.

I told Hank that I'd like to re-connect with Creath, whom I'd known since we were both neofans. On Saturday, I got a long, detailed letter from the man I consider as close as possible to the second coming of <u>Redd Boggs</u>. He sure

sounds like a man about to de-gafiate, but just corresponding with him is an unalloyed pleasure.

And all of this happened because we share a long history through Fandom. If I got nothing else out of the hobby, I'd consider my time and effort in Fandom well-spent.

So come back, <u>Lane Lambert!</u> Rejoin us, <u>David Haugh!</u> Come home, <u>Greg Dees!</u> I miss you, <u>Bruce Telzer!</u>
Olly-Olly Osinfree!

The slogan for today is FIAFR! — Fandom Is a Family Reunion!

London Calling

London Calling by Rob Hansen

Last time out I wrote about the third of London's venerable first-Thursday meetings to be held at the new venue, Walkers. Who could have guessed the fourth would be disrupted by terrorism? As you know, four bombs went off in London on Thursday 7th July, killing over 50 people and shutting down the Underground network.

I work in Whitechapel, very close to the Royal London Hospital which was receiving most of the dead and injured, so there were ambulances rushing past my office window most of the day.

This did not stop me or most other Londoners turning up at work the next day - my boss would not have been impressed if I'd begged off work just because a few bombs had gone off - but it did stop most of us getting to the pub Thursday evening. With the Underground shut down and police cordons all over the place, there was no way of getting home afterwards even if I had walked there on foot. As it turns out about a half dozen hardy souls - who were presumably already nearby anyway - did make it to Walker's, only to find it shut. So they decamped to the nearby Printer's Devil, a pub which had stayed open, thus ensuring that unbroken line of post-war meetings.

August was, of course, the month the Worldcon came to Britain again. As happened last time it was here, in 1995, there were those of us who either could not afford to attend or who actively dislike such huge conventions. Last time we organised a small relaxacon, PRECURSOR, the weekend before Worldcon in order to attract those fannish fans here for Worldcon we wanted to see and to hang out with them. From a socializing point of view, PRECURSOR delivered far more of the sort of bang for the buck we were looking for than a Worldcon ever could and was considered a great success by all who attended.

Plans for a second PRECURSOR this time fell apart, alas, but Avedon and I threw a party at our house for those in town on Saturday 30th July.

Overseas fans attending included Lise Eisenberg, Moshe Feder, Jack Heneghan, Sharee Carton, Patrick Nielsen Hayden, Randy Byers, Spike Parsons, Murray Moore, GUFF Winners Damien Warman and Juliette Woods, and others I'm sure I've forgotten.

We laid on our usual party spread and I cooked up a big pot of my own recipe chili, something I only usually cook for parties. This was well received, with Patrick, Jack and I divvying up what was left over for breakfast the next morning. Patrick and Jack were our house guests for several days and Patrick was stunned to see a fox casually

strolling along our garden wall one afternoon. But then, I don't suppose most people expect to see wild beasts roaming the back gardens of London.

There was a special evening gathering in Walker's on Monday 1st August, the sort of one off that has often been held in the first-Thursday pub before a British Worldcon. All of those who had been at our party were there, and a great many more besides. Even Dave Langford showed up, and he hasn't been a regular at these things in many a moon. Typically, I forgot to make a list, but other North American fans I recall being there included Erik Olsen, Tom Becker, Colin Hinz, Catherine Crockett, and Jae Leslie Adams. This meeting was supposed to be an 'as well as' rather than an 'instead of', but at the regular first-Thursday meeting three days later only six of us turned up. OK, a lot of people would either already have been in Glasgow for Worldcon or preparing to leave, but we can't have been the only halfdozen fans in the South-East who weren't, surely?

Oh well, normal service will presumably be resumed at the September meeting this coming Thursday, and in the meantime we did our bit to maintain that unbroken line, just as those who made it the previous month had. Gotta keep up those fannish traditions.



As soon as Joyce is home, <u>Lori Forbes</u> will set a new date. This should be just a short postponement.


Attendance Down at Last Weekend's Events!



Thanks for *VFW#39*, which is a welcome read after my marathon (six and a half weeks) expedition to Thailand to escape the worst of Melbourne's winter. The highlight was rich brown's segment of fan history that deals with the influence of Francis Towner Laney and Charles Burbee. Both were active in the 1940s and both have had a not inconsiderable influence on what fandom is today. I was attracted to Melbourne fandom in the mid 1950s when legal and social sanctions for overt expressions of homosexuality were extreme.

The object lesson of what happened to Alan Turing, the founding genius of modern computer science, was burned into our souls, adversely affecting our approach to engaging with life both then and for decades afterwards. In the 1950's Melbourne fandom was an accurate reflection of how rich brown describes LA fandom in the 1940's, ie. a microcosm devoted to a form of literature aimed at adolescent males which attracted only a handful of females.

I am far from suggesting that a majority of the shy lads who preferred fandom to remain a mostly male province were homosexual, but many of us were, although we were painfully unaware of our shared identity at the time. Among figures in history who, one can be reasonably certain, did more harm than good in their spheres of influence are Vlad the Impaler, Adolf Hitler and Slobodan Milosovich. From what rich brown says about him, Laney was up there with them.

A highlight of my visit to Thailand was a visit to an animal sanctuary in Chonburi Province where they have developed a technique for breeding tigers in captivity. The trick is to bring them up with other animals, especially (and surprisingly), pigs. Attached are two photos, the first showing a female tiger suckling a litter of piglets. The latter are done up in tiger rugs and bows. Not that that made any difference one way or the other to the tiger; it was done entirely for the purpose of the photo. The other is a picture of me bottlefeeding a seven week old tiger cub who was being weaned. Mum in the background seems anxious.. I would have been worried about that except for

the fact that mum is, in fact, a plaster mould.

I am sorry to hear of your back strain, but pleased for Joyce who has recovered from angioplasty to the extent of being able to contemplate eye and foot surgery before the year is out. Best wishes to both of you for optimum restoration.

It is very clear from the fact that Laney had gay friends (whom he did not attack for their sexual preferences if he was even aware of them) and the nature of his attacks when he made them, that he did an uncharacteristic sloppy job of focusing his wrath. Laney is not against homosexuals as much as he is concerned about homosexual pederasts who aggressively cruised the LASFS' youngest teen male members. (There weren't any young girls for hetero hunters to exploit, so that simply didn't come up.)

A provincial from Idaho, Laney made the classic mistake of attributing to an entire group the transgressions of a few individuals. This blemish on his reputation should be instructive for those who frame sentences that begin "All [blank] are..."


deal better...and keep his hair! I wish Alan the best. His site is fantastic and has helped me out a couple of times when I've needed art.
