What is OLD ACRES?

Nestled in a beautiful wilderness area northwest of Indianapolis, Old Acres, home of Midwest Computer Camp, offers the natural environment so essential to a full camping experience.

There are winding trails and secluded ravines for hiking, bird watching and other nature studies. The spacious lawns make ideal areas for an archery match, shooting basketballs or a friendly volleyball game. A large portion of the 50 acre estate is maintained as a wildlife refuge, where deer and other animals can often be seen.

In the center of Old Acres is a large, well shaded, open area with a barbecue pit and a screened-in picnic building, which is used for crafts and organized camp activities. And, of course, there is a picnic grove for sunny days and a campfire site for starlit nights.

At Old Acres, there is plenty of room to explore the wonders of the computer world as well as the great outdoors, share memorable times with newly found friends and learn more about how microcomputers can enhance your future.

The rugged setting, modern conveniences and relaxed atmosphere coupled with the Midwest Computer Camp's newest equipment and fully trained staff make time spent at Old Acres a rewarding investment.



Computer Education

Each student attending the camp will spend at least six hours a day in active, "hands-on" computer training. The camp uses all of the popular hardware and most of the available software for all brands of equipment.

Hardware

During class time students will have exclusive use of an Apple II+, Atari 400, Atari 800, Commodore 64, IBM PC, RS Model I, RS Model III, RS Model 12, RS Model 16, RS Color, TI-99 4/A, or Vic 20 microcomputer. Students have their choice of equipment, but are encouraged to use a variety to develop true skill with the language or application they are learning. Special emphasis is placed on the student working with the type of equipment they have access to at home or school.

Software

The curriculum includes a variety of programs for different skill levels, and students are advanced upon their individual achievement. These programs include Introduction to Microcomputers; BASIC, PASCAL, FORTRAN, COBOL, Pilot, LOGO, and Assembly Languages; Robotics; Games; Business Applications; Sound; Graphics; and System Operations.

Skill Development Programs

Learning centers and specific classes are available on unusual aspects of computer education such as SAT preparation drills, language enrichment, and current software, including word processing, electronic spread sheets, telecommunications, and database management.

Whether a student is encountering a computer for the first time or is ready for tutoring in advanced classes, our method of flexible, personal counseling in an interactive classroom assures that all students will succeed and receive maximum benefit according to their interest, knowledge, and length of stay.



Camping Was Never Like This!

At Midwest Computer Camp, we believe in providing the finest camping experience possible for the camper. A true camping experience develops warm lasting friendships, an appreciation of our environment, self reliance, and a healthy outlook on life.

However, our first and foremost objective is teaching the use, programming, and application of microcomputers. The setting, atmosphere, and conduct of staff is, therefore, academic in nature and conducive to learning.

Nature & Microcomputers Perfectly Blended!

Midwest Computer Camp is the largest, independent, year around, residential camp exclusively devoted to computer education in the United States. All of our efforts are geared to providing a friendly, comfortable, and fun atmosphere in which to learn about microcomputers.

Once attending Midwest Computer Camp, students know the difference between playing games and using the computer to expand their horizons.



Ratios and Statistics

A high staff to camper ratio of 1:4 and computer to student ratio of better than 1:1 insure campers an exceptional opportunity to learn and progress. Although we have facilities for over 100 campers, summer sessions are limited in enrollment to provide individual attention.

Campers spend over six (6) hours per day in computer training and additional time in open sessions working on programs or playing computer games.

Roughly 50% of our campers have had no previous computer experience and yet many are attending camp to learn assembly language or to solve problems with machine graphics.

While girls currently make up about 30% of our campers, the percentage is growing steadily. Campers are evenly distributed throughout the age range accepted. (8-16 years)

Geographically, campers come from throughout the country and represent all races, nationalities, and creeds.

Accommodations

Old Acres, home of Midwest Computer Camp, is a magnificent old estate with many handsome buildings including a two-story Director's Carriage House, beautiful stable type building with attached apartment, and a rustic log cabin lodge, which provide excellent dormitories for campers and housing for the staff. They are warm, clean, and fully carpeted.

In these spacious, comfortable surroundings, there is a fireside room, sun porch, game room and library for the camper's use. There are numerous indoor tiled baths and lavatories with plenty of hot water and all buildings meet strict state codes.

At the focal point of Old Acres on a landscaped knoll is the brick, Colonial style Education Center, with classrooms, administration offices and large meeting rooms. It is clean, bright and temperature/humidity controlled; a pleasant and conducive learning environment.

The first-aid station is fully-equipped to handle emergencies. A registered nurse is on the site each morning and a physician on call 24 hours a day. Parents may be assured that their young campers are well cared for at Midwest Computer Camp!



Experience

Over 3,000 people have received computer training at Midwest Computer Camp, the largest, full time, year around, residential computer camp in the nation. We do not operate only during summer as a side line like many camps. Our staff, facilities, and equipment continue to grow and develop on a year around basis with programs for schools, weekend camps, and adult classes.

Counselor Training

Counselors are carefully selected from among college students majoring in computers with teaching and/or camping backgrounds or experience in working with young people. Counselors working with skill areas are selected for their specific qualifications such as water safety, arts & crafts, and archery.

Each counselor is then brought to the camp and given a ten day course on our methods of teaching, handling of medical emergencies and needs, dealing with home sickness, safety, use and care of equipment, and role modeling, to insure each is properly equipped and trained to provide sound guidance and support to campers.

Camp Activities

An important part of the camping experience is healthy, active, outdoor recreation. While some extra-curricular activities are mandatory, most are elective. Campers sign up daily for those activities they choose to participate in, such as:

Activities are scheduled to provide breaks between classroom sessions. Campers are given "free time" to spend at the library, quiet room, recreation areas, campfire site, concession stand, or game room. Some campers choose to spend this extra time with the computers, watching a movie, getting a sun tan, or participating in discussion groups. Campers can attend nearby religious services if desired.

We want Midwest Computer Camp to be an enriching and rewarding experience that a young person will remember and cherish all of their life.

This schedule provides each camper with 2 1/2 hours of free time, 6 1/2 hours of computer time, 1 1/2 hours meal time, and 5 hours of planned recreation time per day!

Grouping & Scheduling

Campers are grouped in the classroom activities by skill and then age, while in other activities, campers are grouped by age and interest.

Boys and girls are housed separately, and counselors live with campers on a 24 hour basis.

While campers may elect many activities or learning centers, class work is divided based on observed skill, knowledge, and ability. Each student is encouraged to pursue those areas in which they have expressed interest.

All students get an introduction into the many areas of computers including music, sound, color, graphics, robotics, games, all types of hardware and peripherals, and most of the available software.



Meals

Hot delicious meals which are inspected and balanced to meet nutritional standards are served cafeteria style. In addition, night time snacks are provided each camper and the kitchen is stocked with supplemental items for the hungry camper. A vending area is also open with soft drinks and snacks.

Campers are free to dine in the fireside room; on the screened-in veranda; the nature room overlooking a rugged wooded ravine; the gathering room, a popular place where campers share experiences; or, on the tree covered patio.

Aquatic Activities

All water activities are supervised by a fully certified water safety instructor and the water is routinely tested to meet standards established by the State Board of Health. While some water activities are organized, campers may spend some of their free time in the pool or getting a tan under the summer sun.

President

Lynn Crawford has developed and sold computer programs, taught computer training courses, conducted training programs for school teachers, and serves as a computer consultant for school systems, real estate and retail companies. He is a published author of computer/real estate articles and a wildlife book; and the owner/developer of two wildlife refuges. Lynn is personally involved in every aspect of the camp.

Camp Director

Frank Unum is Woodbadge trained, an active outdoorsman, camp planner, scoutmaster; and has taught nature study, wildlife, conservation, astronomy and related camping subjects. He is past president of one of the state's largest computer clubs.

Permanent Staff

A carefully selected and fully trained staff of instructors, counselors, and support personnel, maintain permanent records of camper's progress, and provide a follow-up program of pertinent information and programming assistance to campers through out the year.

Parents and potential campers are invited to visit Midwest Computer Camp any time. The facilities are open seven days a week, year around.

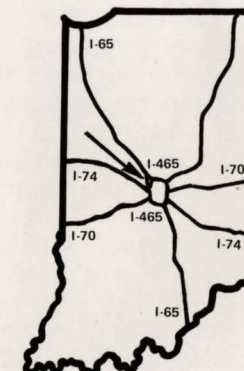

Location

Midwest Computer Camp derives it's name from it's location in the center of the country. It is located just off the I465 loop around Indianapolis, IN, only minutes from Indianapolis International Airport. While close to a metropolitan area, the camp is just north of Eagle Creek reservoir, in a rugged wooded area. This central location saves money in airline fees and travel time compared to other nationally recognized camps.

Campers arriving at the bus station or airport will be transported to and from the camp without additional cost.



Games

A young student learning to use the microcomputer has little need for, or interest in, an amortization schedule or budgeting program which adults find so practical. Campers find a real attraction to games and enjoy creating and modifying them. The skill required to develop a good game exceeds the skill required to develop a budget program.

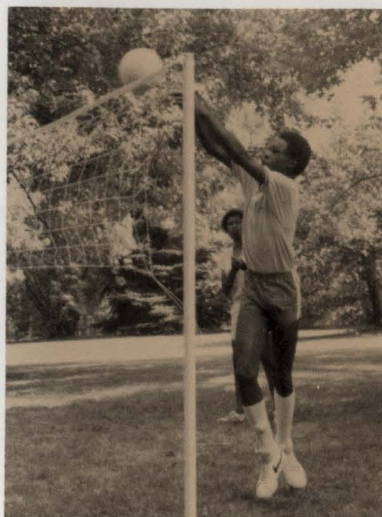
By utilizing their interest areas, students learn about operating systems, logic, programming techniques, gain a thorough understanding of the language being used, and are capable of writing programs. Each camper is taken as far as their interest, skill, and length of stay allow, on an individual basis!



CERTIFICATES

Each student will receive a Certificate of Completion for the courses completed to show with pride, a testimony of the ability to understand and use computers and a record of progress and accomplishment.

Registration Procedure

When your registration form and deposit are received, you will be sent an enrollment packet including the following:

A list of what to bring and what not to bring; a camp policies form; a medical history form; a computer skill survey; camp activity interest form; map and travel information; and complete parent information.

Changes in dates will be made, if required, providing dates are available. Fees are refundable until May 15th.

To ensure a place for your youngster and your choice of dates (determined by earliest postmark), you should register as soon as possible. We anticipate full sessions. Enrollment is limited to provide personal attention. (see ratios and statistics)

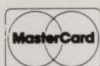
September through May

From September through May, Midwest Computer Camp at Old Acres offers a variety of programs in computer education for adults and young people; including weekend camps, classes, and school programs.

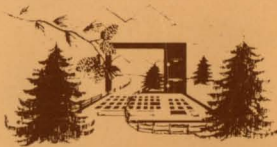

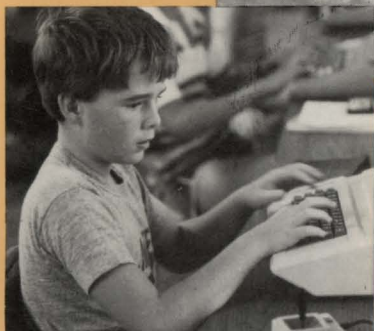
